Pastor's Message

The Bridge of Love

It was my privilege to offer a lecture on the great American writer Thornton Wilder at the Noontime Philosopher's Club this past week. Wilder is unique among American writers not just because he received three Pulitzer Prizes for his writing, but because he received them in different categories; drama (for his plays *Our Town* and *The Skin of Our Teeth*) and fiction (for his novella *The Bridge of San Luis Rey*).

The first of Wilder's most celebrated works, *The Bridge of San Luis Rey*, was written in 1927. Back in my day, it was a standard required text for my High School English class. It tells the stories of five unrelated people who happen to be on a bridge in Peru when it collapses, killing them all. Wilder uses this incident to plunge us deeply into questions of fate and providence. Why those five people? Why at that specific moment in their lives? Was this part of some divine plan or purpose? Through the character of Brother Juniper, we undertake a quest to find patterns in the tragedy that would make sense of the event. Were these victims innocent and undeserving of their fate, or had their lives come to some kind of completion making their deaths a kind of heavenly reward?

Brother Juniper's work finds no easy answers in his search; in fact, he himself is condemned as a heretic for attempting to discern God's patterns of providence. The end of the book finds us with the quest for answers given up. Even those closest to the victims have fading memories of the people who died on the bridge. Wilder uses the character of Madre Maria to muse on the meaning of it all:

"Even now, she thought, "almost no one remembers Estaban and Pepita, but myself. Camila alone remembers her Uncle Pio and her son; this woman, her mother. But soon she shall die and all memory of those five will have left the earth, and we ourselves shall be loved for a while and forgotten. But the love will have been enough; all those impulses of love return to the love that made them. Even memory is not necessary for love. There is a land of the living and a land of the dead and the bridge is love, the only survival, the only meaning."

May you be blessed with such love this Valentine's Day!

Dear Friends,

My family and I want to again express our deep gratitude for the prayers and compassionate care we have received from so many in the congregation these past several months.

Honestly, there were times I did not expect to see a full year pass after my diagnosis of metastatic breast cancer in January 2019. The fact that I am doing as well as I am over a year later is a testament not only to medical

intervention but to the many ways you have carried me through this time with abiding faith and hope.

I am deeply grateful for the benefit of short term disability, which allowed me to focus so completely on my health since last August. On February 11, 2020, I will move on to long term disability, as my diagnosis and prognosis have not changed. Therefore, after prayerful consideration and conversation, it is now time for me to formally resign from my role as Pastor for Congregational Care and Mission as of February 11, 2020, because of my ongoing health concerns.

I do not have words for how blessed I felt to have been called to serve among you. This last year has been difficult for all of us, and I have appreciated the many ways our church leaders and staff, especially Pastor Steve and Pastor Nick, have accommodated the challenges posed by my illness. I pray that this formal transition will allow all of us to move forward with gratitude for what has been and hope for the future, especially for the incredible ministry and mission of First Congregational.

The Little Task Force That Will... Oshkosh ESTHER Task Force

Our ESTHER Social Justice umbrella spans over the entire fox valley area which includes Oshkosh where on the first Tuesday of every month a small but mighty ecumenical group work to improve the living standards for Oshkosh citizens.

For seven years this team's goal surprisingly has been to provide free busing for all students to get to and from school. Yes, it's true. Currently, all students must pay \$2.00 per trip to use the bus. Which means that regardless of income every student must pay \$20.00 a week to get to and from school.

Oshkosh ESTHER is well on their way to provide students free bussing. They have raised tens of thousands of dollars on their own which is a third of the money

that is needed. They have also received another third of the funding from an anonymous donor. They are just waiting for the city council to provide the final third from the city budget. Apparently, they are still waiting. Who would have thought that providing free bussing for students would be so difficult?

Realm this Week: Getting Started

First, you need to find your Realm invitation email or ask the church office to send you another one. The subject line will say something like "Join your church community online." You will start the process with the link contained in the email. Follow the directions to set up your password. Then a second verification email will be sent with another link. Once you go to that link, you are at your Realm page.

Click your name and select My Profile. Your first step is to check all the contact and personal information in your profile. Make any corrections and add any missing data. (Please enter your full birthday. The year and your age will **not** be displayed on your church profile.)

We'd also like to have you add your photo. Click on the circle to the left of your name. Select a nice photo of yourself from your files. Now you can position or

resize the photo as necessary and hit save. Please have a close-up of you - not your family, dog or avatar.

Now that you are logged in you can view the church directory. Go to the navigation menu and find Directory. The Directory is a list of individuals associated with our church.
